Dear People of Llansilin

As I write this, the news are dominated by the Foot and Mouth disease which is proving so devastating to every aspect of rural life, whatever its relationship to agriculture. The personal worry and sorrow of the farmer has grown to be a personal concern for each and every one of us. This outbreak has often been referred to as a *crisis*. Years ago, whenever there was a crisis, special prayer meetings were called so that people could join together in the common cause to pray for help and guidance in order to cope. I am convinced that today, many a prayers have and are still said for the people who are affected by this present crisis wherever people are gathered together.

Of course we hear of a crisis in different parts of the world almost on a daily basis. It is precisely for this reason that we have an annual Christian Aid week as Christians recognise their duty to help our brothers and sisters who face a crisis, whether it is a famine, earthquake, flooding or whatever. We certainly feel the severity of the Foot and Mouth crisis in our country today. Imagine then the utter hopelessness of a poor farmer in a poor country in the face of a crisis that threatens not only his livelihood but often his life and that of his family and neighbours as well. A little help mean a lot in such a situation, and we are for the most part able to offer something to ease the situation.

We have had reason to complain of a wet winter this year. A recent report stated that we could be facing a world wide water shortage before 2025, a water crisis, not only in those countries where there is drought already but everywhere. Apparently, there is a call here to act urgently on this very likely crisis.

And a final thought on crisis, that effect Church and Chapel congregations alike. The retreat from God and religion has become like a fever, but, there is a cure, if we listen to the prophet Hosea –“I will heal their faithlessness” (Hosea 14th Chapter). There is hope for us all and with Gods help we can cope in a crisis.

Llansilin Church

An explanation for the two Chapels from Archaeologia Cambrensis (1894) page 14

At first a small chapel dedicated to the worship of Mary was built alongside the nave. With the worship of Mary increasing in popularity the chapel was enlarged and became the same size as the original Church.

In 1534 there was a lawsuit between the two sons of Llywelyn ap Ieuan Vychan of Moeliwrch as to whom should inherit the family pew. One son claimed that in accordance with old Welsh law, all sons had equal claim whilst the other son claimed that the law of Henry VIII, the law of primogeniture, should be observed with the property going to the eldest son. The court of High Commission passed that Morris, the eldest son was to have the pew in the chapel of Mary and the youngest son Thomas, a pew in St Silin's chapel.

More information about the life these two brothers can be obtained from *Gwaith Gwallter Mechain Cyfrol III* The English Works of the Rev Walter Davies (late vicar of Llanrhaidr YM) of which the Vicar has a treasured copy.

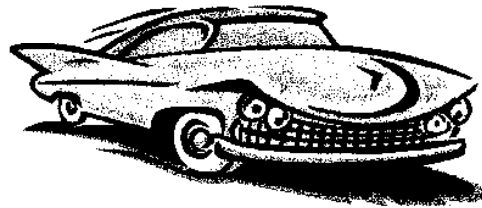
Vandals have damaged one of the floodlights in the churchyard. If you have information about this please contact the police.

The Village Recycling Plant has realised nearly £400 this year for the **Playing Fields**. Cans and glass seem to generate the highest payment. Thanks to all for their support and please keep it up. Negotiations are going on for a much needed cardboard container.

Money matters

Accounts for St Silin's Church has been prepared and a copy is displayed on the notice board in the porch. The running costs for year 2000 amounted to £16,700 and the income to £15,584. The annual quota, which is money that this parish pays to the diocese, is £4,156 this year.

The main expenses were repairs to the gutters and restoration of the porch gates at St Silin's. Systems and records are now in hand to handle GWADD (Give with a Direct Debit), ad hoc Gift Aid Donations and the Envelope Scheme as well as the remaining Covenants. Tax refunds have been obtained for last year's Gift Aid donations and those from GWADDs are flowing in every month. The priority now is to ensure that expiring covenants are converted into GWADDs and to attract new donors to this scheme. Volunteers are definitely wanted! Contact Graham Moss Tel 791 528.

The Church has installed security lighting, a new weathercock, repaired leaking gutters and repaired the porchgates as well as acquiring wooden nativity figures given by Mr and Mrs Renshaw. Discussions on re-ordering are taking place on a regular basis co-ordinated by Graham Moss and Chris Burton is producing virtual reality options available for people to look at.

The Officers of the PCC and the Churchwardens were thanked for their services to the Church and all were re elected to serve a further year. Mr Eric Avery was elected as a new member onto the PCC.

The Church is the people and the vicar thanked all that partake in its activities, as it would not function without them. He is much occupied in the deanery with clerical matters, which he hopes will ease when an

Life at Ysgol Bro Cynllaith

Year 5 and 6 visited Erddigg Hall with Miss Marsden for a hands on experience to connect with their current study topic 'Houses'.

A small ceremony was held in May when the children placed their Millennium Time Capsule under the floor in the ringing chamber of St Silin's Church.

Year 2 and 6 have been taking their keystone 1 and 2 tests.

Notes from the belfry

The ringers are making brilliant progress. They are now able to do hunting, - quite an achievement in the time they have been ringing.

The group are particularly proud to have the young ringers, Gareth Jones, Toby Scott and the youngest, Amber Scott who is now able to handle the No 3 bell on her own under the watchful guidance of her grandfather Eric, the Tower Captain.

Sales of The Bell Restoration Video, sold in aid of Church funds, have been doing well both here and abroad. On June 9th, St Silin's is hosting a meeting of North Wales Association of Bell ringers.



Yes, it's that time of the year again! This large space which seem to grow grass like nowhere else is in need of regular loving care during the months ahead. Many hands make light work and all that, and the regular loyal gang who have kept the churchyard looking tidy for many years would truly appreciate some extra hands.

The churchyard existed before any church, as a burial ground and was often circular in this part of the country, and there are signs to suggest that ours may have been circular too. The oldest gravestone in our churchyard, on the south side, dates back to the dark ages. The oldest yew trees are over a thousand years old, standing as a symbol of eternity, an idea probably adopted by Christians from pagan times. In the Middle Ages, the burial ground would have had a small wooden chapel by it, just large enough for the priest to stand in whilst saying mass. Later a larger wooden Church was built on the site and a stone one around 1200. Our present Church was built in the 15th Century, possibly after the English destroyed it during the Owain Glyndwr rebellion. During the Middle Ages the churchyard was a village meeting place. It was rare for a Church to be sited in the centre, but more commonly near the north boundary. The larger, southern part was consecrated and used for burials whereas the northern part was used for a number of secular activities, which may seem unsuitable to us today. People would spend their leisure hours here with markets held and plays performed. The festival of the patron saint Gwylmabsant would have been celebrated in our churchyard in early October with feasting, games and a fair, as well as dancing and drinking of ale. Games were played in the north part of the churchyard and there are lines marked out for ball

games on the church wall still visible today. In some areas cockfighting took place not only in the churchyard but sometimes it was even tolerated in the nave!

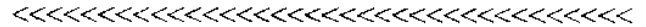
Older than any existing gravestone is the lower part of the shaft of a medieval preaching cross found in the SW corner of the Church. The cross itself would have been destroyed at the reformation or by the Roundhead soldiers who occupied the Church during the civil war. The shaft now carries a little sundial put in the churchyard in 1714, beside the path leading to the new graves.

The area between the churchyard and the road, referred to as the nursery, is said to have been used as a market for cattle and horses, the animals having been tethered to the churchyard wall. Twelve hornbeams replaced the beech trees, which were felled after outgrowing their space, one for each of the twelve apostles.

Between the wars, the Community Council took on responsibility for the upper part (northern) of the churchyard, which was full. The lower ground, our present burial area, remained the property of The Church in Wales.

In the 1960's the PCC undertook to look after the old part of the churchyard as well with a grant from the Community Council, which today is £ 150.

The whole of the centre of the village is a conservation area, thus protected from development. Many churchyards have become peaceful places where bird-life thrives and conservationists are able to study flora and fauna. Sadly, many have also become so neglected and overgrown that they are no longer recognisable as burial grounds at all. What is needed is manpower, lots of it, to keep it tidy and living for everyone in the village to enjoy. Make a note, **Thursday nights 6.30pm!** Come and lend a hand and help keep our churchyard a place to be proud of. It's full of history, as well as a final resting place of our loved ones.



Llansilin Playscheme and Community Group

A Special Needs Worker, Julie O'Sullivan, has been appointed for three years to work 20 hours per week. She is experienced in this work and will work with children from the village primary schools of Llangedwyn, Llansilin, Llanrhaeadr and Llansaintffraid as well as playgroup children. She has over forty children on her register and a waiting list! There is an obvious need for more hours, and an extra ten hours per week have been applied for as well as an additional post for fifteen hours. 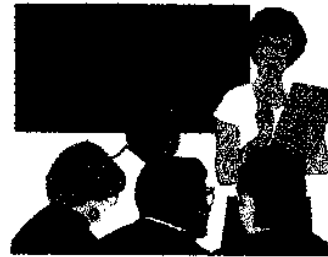

Village Hall Translation Equipment

A recent survey carried out by a Powys CC Project Worker indicated an approximate 50/50 split between Welsh and English speaking members of the community. A significant number of activities are carried out through the medium of the Welsh language and the hall committee see the usefulness of translation equipment in bridging the gap between the Welsh and English speaking groups in the community. They hope this will encourage people who don't speak Welsh to be able to partake in Welsh speaking activities. Indeed, there has already been encouraging interest shown by English speakers in the local eisteddfod when the committee hired the translation equipment for that specific event. Today, it is not unusual for children of English speaking only parents to choose to learn through Welsh in school, a sign that the committee finds encouraging. The committee itself consist of 35 members who speak both English and Welsh, 21 of these represent local organisations that support this initiative. Whilst it is possible to hire this equipment, the advantages of owning it and having it available at all times is well worth the investment. The equipment use will primarily be promoted through the hall committee. Posters, flyers and all advertising for appropriate events will contain prominent indication of the availability of translation equipment at the event. Use will also be made of local newsletters (e.g. Llansilin Newsletter, Yr Ysgug, Tanat Chronicle) and papers.

Initially, the committee will encourage the use of the equipment at all Welsh speaking events hoping that this will encourage anyone interested to take part regardless and thus bridging the gap of existing language barriers. Feed back on the progress of this policy will hopefully be obtained through the representatives of the community organisations on the hall committee. It will also be possible to monitor the number of times the equipment has been used by the community organisations at specific events.
