

The Vicar's viewpoint

In February I hope to travel with a party from Oswestry School to Germany and Poland, visiting sites associated with Nazi atrocities during the Second World War and the resistance to them. Recently I attended a preparatory session at the school which ended with a video based on the transcript of a meeting held in 1942 at one of the houses which we will be visiting: the conference which outlined "The Final Solution of the Jewish Problem" – nothing less than the total extermination of European Jewry, the greatest crime of the violent and bloodstained 20th century. And yet, perhaps the most chilling aspect of the affair was how ordinary it all was: a mixed bunch of officers and civil servants discussing ways and means over a working lunch, while waiters hovered attentively and the drivers of the staff cars enjoyed a snowball fight outside. These men were not monsters in human form; they were people not unlike us, who had somehow blanked off whole areas of their minds to exclude from sympathy or fellowfeeling entire sections of the human race.

Watching them chatting, smoking and enjoying their food, it occurred to me that this was how Caiaphas, Pilate and Herod might have settled the problem of what to do with a troublesome Galilean preacher, with little more concern than if they'd been swatting a fly. When Jesus prayed, "Father, forgive them, because they don't know what they're doing", his prayer embraced not just those who put him on the cross, but all those whose intolerance, self-interest, indifference or blinkered obedience to orders continually crucify him afresh in the bruised and abused bodies and minds of those whom they fail to recognise as fellow human beings.

The recent history of Palestine, Rwanda, Bosnia, Northern Ireland and Saddam Hussein's Iraq warns us how easy it is for neighbours to come to demonise each other as "them". Jesus' prayer for his murderers, and his wounded hands outstretched to us all, proclaim the only answer: admission of the flawed humanity which we all share, which could make monsters of any of us, unless we constantly remember that, in God's sight, there are no "them", only "us".





Finances at St. Silin's

It was the Gift Aid Secretary's dream come true. A parishioner rang to discuss a different point and as we were about to close he asked, "How is my GWADD working?" GWADD (Give with a Direct Debit) is a tax-efficient way to donate to the Church each month and very reliable. "Fine", I answered. Then came the surprise. "Am I giving enough?" he asked. Well, what is a Gift Aid Secretary to say? I explained the effects of inflation, the many calls on our finances, including our resolution to help others worse off than ourselves (over £1500 to good causes in 2003) and the fact that our biggest expense – the "Quota" - has increased by a whopping 17%. My caller immediately responded, "Then please increase my GWADD by 20%". Perfect!

Can I ask other GWADD donors, those who give via the Envelopes Scheme and via the Open Plate to consider similar action, please? If you haven't reviewed your level of giving recently, this is a good time to do it. Please call me on 791 528 if you would like to discuss.





I thought it might be useful to illustrate the everyday income and expense picture, stripping out exceptional items like major improvements and repairs, based on provisional numbers for last year when we did just better than break-even.

Challenges in 2004 include funding the induction loop/loudspeaker system, possible work on the organ and improvements for disabled access. We will also need to start serious fund raising for the long-planned extension.

Our village school finally emerged from under the cloud of school closure following the decision by Powys County Council that Ysgol Bro Cynllaith should be retained. This decision ended months of speculation and uncertainty for children, parents, teachers and governors.

Everyone in Llansilin, Llangedwyn and Llanrhaeadr was always clear about what was best for the local community. We all supported the need for a new school at Llanrhaeadr but we all wanted to keep our independence. The whole community joined in the campaign. The situation was a nightmare for our local Councillor Harry Hughes but he represented our interests well at Committee succeeded in persuading his fellow councilors to support our cause.

Our relief at escaping closure is tinged with regret that Llangedwyn School is still under the spotlight. Let's hope that Powys soon sees sense and leaves a good school alone.

RECYCLING IN LLANSILIN

The latest figures we have are for the 6 months of April to September 2003:

The total amount recycled has increased from 2.97 tons in April to 4.53 tons in September, which is very gratifying. We don't have figures for plastic and cans as they are only released once a year. Also very pleasing is that sorting the plastics provides much-needed employment for disabled people through Cae Glas, a non-profit making charity. Well done and keep up the good work, everybody!

A Busy Christmas at St Silin's

St Silin's enjoyed a very busy and highly successful Advent season, with a number of special events. We had a break with former practice and decorated the church well before the traditional services. This provided a most attractive setting for a full house of parents and children for the Ysgol Bro Cynllaith Festival of Light. The specially devised Advent Sunday service performed by the Guilsfield Singers was simply outstanding and the annual Plygain was the best ever, with more "partis" than ever before and one group even travelling from Aberystwyth.

Llansilin Choir performed a concert of Christmas music in aid of the Llangadwaladr restoration appeal that was equally well received. The Christmas Eve candle-lit service was very well attended and the annual Carol Service was enjoyed by many. Finally, at the Christingle service in January, children were presented with "christingles", made by Mrs Sheila Ashley.

Most of these services were heralded by the church bells rung by St Silin's band of ringers.

Crowning Success

The crown of light at the top of the church tower was lit for all of these events and throughout Advent. The feedback on this feature has been hugely positive. Gross receipts were £452 enabling us, after expenses, to give over £200 to each of our chosen charities: Alice Ward at the Orthopaedic and for children in Uganda. "Well done and many thanks" to everyone who gave so much of their time to create and maintain the crown, promote the causes and collect the money.

Other News from St Silin's

The November Remembrance Service took place at St Silin's with Mrs Iona Jones playing the organ.

The new year has seen the welcome return of Mrs Deborah Hill-Trevor, Churchwarden, and Miss Morfydd Williams, Organist, following their recent operations.

The churchyard working party has worked hard to improve the cremation plots by the main roadside wall. The site has been enlarged and there is now a much improved gravelled surface which will be easier to look after.

At our November morning service we were joined by Mr and Mrs Bobby Morgan of Oswestry, who were celebrating their Diamond Wedding Anniversary. Both are natives of Llansilin, namely of Penybryn and Parc Moelfre, and were married in this church. A bouquet of flowers was presented to them by the People's Warden, Mary Morris.

LLANSILIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the November meeting Sgt. Antrobus and PC Youens discussed the parking problems in Llansilin. It was agreed that, in the absence of double yellow lines or "no parking" signs, it is difficult to prove obstruction and that the lack of a local police officer does not help. The officers agreed to monitor the situation and, if possible, approach some car owners. The clerk was thanked for his efforts in ensuring that Ysgol Bro Cynnlaith remains open. Dyfed/Powys Police annual policing plan 2004/5 and questionnaire were received. Members were in favour of the Welsh Assembly's proposals to change the 2004 local elections from May to June and to hold a postal ballot. The water fountain in Llansilin has been designated a Grade II listed building. Waiting restrictions at the C2220 junction in Llansilin have been proposed. Council's accounts for 2002/3 are in order. Members agreed to donate £50 each to the Montogomeryshire branch of Alzheimers and Llansilin History Society and £25 to the Shropshire and Mid-Wales Hospice. An application from Llansilin Church for disability access finance was deferred. The following planning applications were approved:

Erection of two-storey extension at 4 Bryn Celyn, Llansilin Erection of garage at Pen Plannau, Moelfre Dwelling and vehicular access at Ty Croes, Llansilin – in principle but with concern at the possible loss of visual amenity

The clerk was requested to report the following complaints: Missing Llanrhaeadr signs on the Llansilin-Llangedwyn road. Water on the Tynyfron road running on to the main road. Pot holes near Clyrun Fach.

The need for road sweeping to be carried out in the area. Potentially dangerous trees near to Bryn Celyn.

At the January meeting the clerk reported that following recent damage to vehicles, he has arranged a meeting with a senior officer of Powys County Council to inspect the kerb stones by Bwylchyrhiw with a view to having them realigned. The badger setts below the Rhydycroesau road would also be inspected. It was agreed to request £2,000 in view of the possible community council election in June. Members approved the housing needs questionnaire, which would be circulated shortly. With regard to ownership of Llangadwaladr churchyard, there was no evidence that it had at any time been owned or administered by the community council. Cllr E O Evans reported on the Llanfyllin Strategy Forum meeting which had included presentations by local young people highlighting the problems they encountered. Members agreed to donate £50 to the Iran earthquake appeal. The following planning applications were approved:

Renovation and alterations at Tynyfron, Llansilin Erection of garage, log store, etc at Penybryn, Llansilin Conversion of barn to dwelling at Pwllymeirch Mawr, Llansilin Conversion of barn to dwelling at:Tanycoed, Llansilin Alterations and extension at Pentre Ucha, Llansilin

The clerk was requested to report the following complaints: Excess water on the Tynyfron, Rhiwlas road Dangerous road between Ysgwennant and Llangadwaladr

FAIRTRADE'S 10th ANNIVERSARY

Fairtrade Fortnight in March this year will celebrate 10 years of helping Third World farmers to earn a living. Last year sales of Fairtrade foods rose by



50%, showing that people do want to buy "quality with a conscience". Choosing food with the Fairtrade mark makes all the difference in the world to these farmers, enabling them to send their children to school, buy healthcare and invest in the future. In Oswestry, there is now a wide range to be found in the Co-op, the Christian Bookshop, Honeysuckle, Sainsbury's and Somerfield - if you can't find what you want, do please ask.

Try this easy recipe for Fairtrade banana cake:

225g (8oz) self-raising flour

100g (4oz) butter

150g (5oz) Fairtrade caster sugar

450g (1llb) Fairtrade bananas (the gooier the better)

175g (6oz) Fairtrade mixed dried fruit

half teaspoon salt

2 eggs

Peel and mash the bananas

Mix all the ingredients together, except dried fruit. When thoroughly mixed, add the dried fruit.

Spoon mixture into a greased 1kg (2lb) loaf tin.

Bake for 1½ hours on 180C/350F/gas 4.
