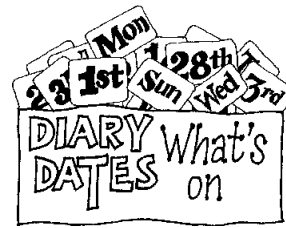

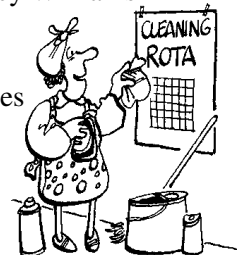

*"Mine eyes shall see the King in His beauty":
Isaiah XXXIII:17.*

*I dreamt of a garden of flowers;
So lovely, so blooming and bright,

*Then when I awoke in the morning,
The day was as dark as the night;
But I thank God for the vision –
It was a reminder of sight.*

*One thing I should like to dream often
Are the bright, happy days as of yore:

YSGOL BRO CYNLLAITH FACES NEW THREAT

Local people must be wondering what Powys County Council are up to. First the Executive Committee makes a decision to save the school and then the Scrutiny Committee demand a detailed study of the relative merits of keeping the existing small schools open or building a new area school. This study should obviously have been done in the first place before our schools were threatened with closure. We have now had this dark cloud hanging over us for almost a year and there is still no end in sight. The Scrutiny Committee came to the school and we had a free and frank discussion about the damage they could do to our community. We followed this up with a statement to the Committee setting out a strong case for leaving our school to get on with the good work it is doing. *(If anyone would like to see a copy of this please contact the editor).*

On 29 April a primary education expert from Aberystwyth University visited the school and was faced with a very vocal group of local people. It was good to see such determination and strength of feeling.

I feel that we have made the strongest possible case to the Scrutiny Committee and we continue to have the full backing of Cllr Harry Hughes. The crucial meeting is on 6 May and I have been invited to attend. Hopefully, by the time you read this, we will have brought back the news that commonsense has prevailed and that the decision to save the school still stands.

Easter Services

The service included the dedication of two delightful hessian angels and a set of pew cushions made by the Llansilin Craft Group. At the end of the service children of the congregation were given Easter eggs.

In contrast, the preceding Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services were held in solemnity, in the Church devoid of decoration. The Good Friday service took the form of dramatic readings by members of the congregation.

Annual Review

At the Church's annual review the Vicar thanked the big team of volunteers who do so much to help run the Church and look after the building and the churchyard. It had been a very busy and successful year and there is much to look forward to in the coming months.

Churchwarden, Mrs Deborah Hill-Trevor, has come to the end of her term of office and, in her place, is Mrs Esther Milner, who will work with the existing Warden, Miss Mary Morris. Mr Graham Moss now combines the role of Treasurer and Gift Aid Secretary.

Grade I Listing for the Church

We are proud to announce that the Church has been upgraded to Grade I listing, making it an even more important and valuable heritage building, nationally, as well as to the village and local community.

FUND-RAISING

It costs £200 a week just for the day-to-day running costs of the Church, eg lighting, oil, insurance, etc. The Church could not hope to meet these costs without the unfailingly generous support of Church members and the wider community at fund-raising events and activities.

LLANSILIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the March meeting condolences were offered to Cllr Mrs Joan Williams on the recent death of her sister. It was reported that the defective kerbing by Bwlchryhiw had been realigned and that the ditches on Nantybrain were being filled and levelled. Planning applications approved:

- two-storey extension at Werninfa, Moelfre
- agricultural storage building at Pwllymeirch, Llansilin
- conversion of a barn to dwelling at Glanrafon, Llansilin

Notification was received from Powys County Council Highways Department that safety measures, including 20 mph signs, would be introduced on the road adjacent to Ysgol Bro Cynllaith following consultation with councillors and school governors. It was agreed to defer consideration of membership to One Voice Wales for the time being. Cllr Mrs Williams kindly offered to be responsible for the Housing Needs questionnaire, which would be available for distribution soon.

The following complaints were reported:

- Llanrhaeadr direction signs required by church gate and crossroads below Llansilin
- Safety mirror at the top of the village needs re-adjusting
- Water on the road near Moelfre lake
- Stile required on the footpath adjacent to Bryn Celyn and Bryn Dentyr
- Defective street light near Bryn Dentyr
- Reflectors needed near Tanrhallt and Tynant, Cefncanol
- Blocked culvert below Lledrode

IMPROVING ACCESS AT ST. SILIN'S

St Silin's has been working towards becoming more user friendly in line with current thinking and legislation. The Disability Discrimination Act, 1995, aims to reduce and ultimately remove obstacles that prevent people from being able to fully participate in all things public. This is quite a tall order, but long overdue. Discrimination is no longer acceptable and people with physical or mental impairment have tended to remain quiet about their needs.

So, it's perfectly fine to park your car outside the church doors to attend services and events if that will make it easier. Inside, there are now some chairs with arms and backrests as well as seat cushions for the pews. There are large-print sheets for Welsh and English communion services and a hearing loop and microphone system is about to be installed. A small ramp is available at the chancel step and, if you are unable to kneel for communion, you can take it standing by the altar rail or sitting in the pews. The churchwardens and members of the congregation are happy to help in any way, so please do ask.

The paths and forecourt of the churchyard are going to be improved and there are plans for a handrail by the slope down into the new part of the churchyard, as well as better lighting at the front entrance. If you experience difficulty in or around the church or churchyard please get in touch with me and, hopefully, we can sort it out for the better.

spans from Owain Glyndwr to David Lloyd George. It tells of nonconformist grievances, especially about burials, and mentions the Rhydycroesau burial episode. The fight for control of Llansilin burial ground is described, as well as denominational tussles at the ballot box in Llansilin and Rhydycroesau. These were the only two border parishes where questions about the future of the Anglican Church went to a second ballot and, in Llansilin, the outcome was unique. In all of Wales it was the only parish to choose to join the emerging Church in Wales.

Written by Charles Stiles, who has given successful talks to several local societies about these rare and unique local events, "State, Church and Chapel" is richly illustrated and will cost £5. Watch out for its arrival!



LLANSILIN SHEEPDOG TRIALS AND SHOW

We shall be celebrating twenty five years of the show on Bank Holiday Monday, 30 August, this year. There is a change to the date for the local sheep dog trials which will be held on the preceding Saturday afternoon, 28 August.

There are 9 classes for the Handicrafts section which include: an item of cross stitch, an article made out of a metre of material, something created out of wool, a greeting card, a decorated egg, something new from something old. The subjects for the photograph section are: "Wrinkles", "Reflections" and Llansilin Village.

BORDERLAND VISUAL ARTS

The BVA was established in January 1999 as a support and information group for serious artists in the area. There are now over 50 members, including Mary Cunnah, Gill Avery and Margaret Charman from Llansilin, covering many visual art disciplines such as painting, photography, sculpture, woodcarving, textiles, pottery and printmaking. The BVA meets on an informal basis once a month at the Heritage Centre. It provides its members with an artists' register, information sheets and newsletters and the opportunity to join in an annual Open Studios Event.

The Open Studio Event is a way of encouraging the public to view contemporary art, when they might not be so keen to go to galleries and museums. People will have the opportunity to meet the artists and discuss the works on display.

This year there are 15 studios open (9 in Oswestry) on 12/13 June and 19/20 June from 11 am to 5 pm. There will be about 22 artists involved, demonstrating the breadth of talent within this area. Mary will be exhibiting at the Queen's Head and Margaret at Pant. Look out for the 3 red balloons on the publicity posters and at the venues.

BROADBAND FOR LLANSILIN

Many thanks to all those who have pre-registered their interest in getting Broadband internet access to Llansilin. In the past few weeks the number of registrations doubled to 75% of BT's required trigger-level. In April BT made a surprise announcement that all remaining viable exchanges (which includes Llansilin) would be enabled for broadband by summer 2005. They will announce the ready-for-service dates in June this year and, as soon as the date for Llansilin is known, you will be able to pre-order a broadband connection through your internet service provider so that you can start using it from day one of the Llansilin exchange being broadband-enabled.

So bad news and good news. Bad news that we have to wait another couple of months before knowing when the service will be available here. Good news that at least it will be no later than next summer (and hopefully much earlier) and that there is no need to pre-register interest.
