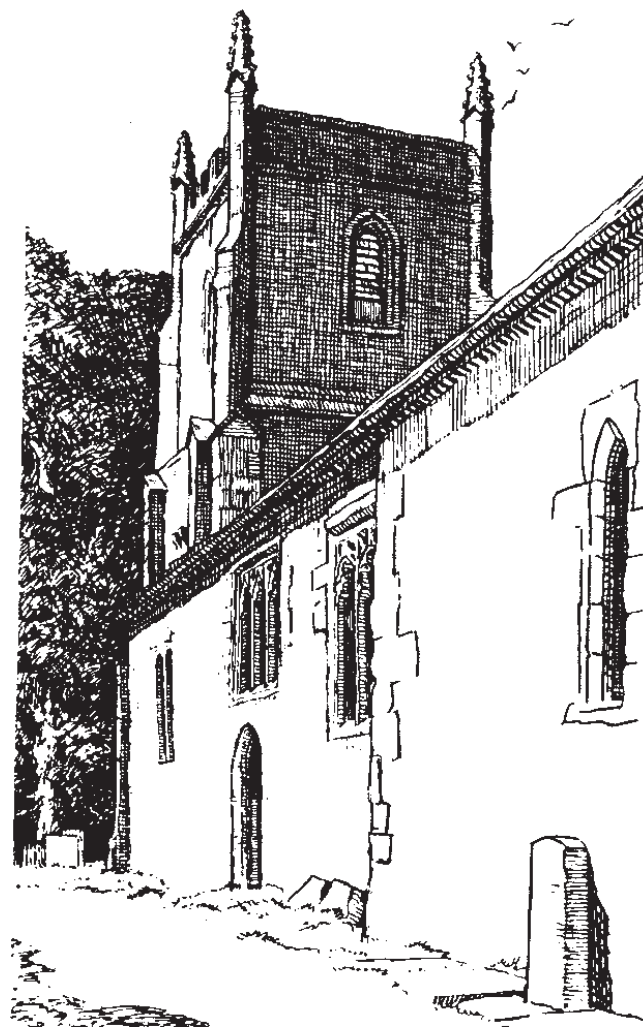

Dear Reader

I feel happy and privileged at being asked to write for the Llansilin newsletter once again. On considering what to tell you in this letter, I decided that I would quote an article that I came across in the quarterly magazine, "Grace", under the heading of "Obituary". The author of the article is unknown.

"Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend by the name of Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valued lessons as knowing when to come in out of the rain, why the early bird gets the worm and that life isn't always fair. Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you earn) and reliable parenting strategies (adults, not kids, are in charge).

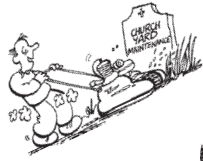

ST CADWALADR'S ALTAR FRONTAL UNVEILED

At a coffee morning in St Silin's Parish Room recently, Llansilin's C.R.A.F.T. group unveiled the altar frontal they have been working on for over a year now and which is destined for St Cadwaladr's Church. Group members have contributed individual creations in embroidery and appliqué and the icon of the Saint in the centre of the cloth is based on the medieval window in St Cadwaladr's Church on Ynys Mon. A magnificent red dragon lies at his feet and all around are examples of our local flora and fauna. The frontal was much admired by everyone and it was clear that people were glad to have the opportunity to show their appreciation of everything the group has produced for the church and the village over the past few years.

The C.R.A.F.T. group was set up in November 2003 following the completion of the rag rug picture of the Llansilin landscape which now hangs in the entrance of the Memorial Hall. Since then they have produced an amazing number of artefacts, which is not bad going for 2 hours on a Monday morning in Norma Garment's front room. They have created four fountain dressings with a difference for the village show in the summer and for the various Christmases they have produced two larger than life hessian angels, a tryptych of windows depicting the Christmas story, paper sculptures of the Three Kings and their special contribution to the Christmas Tree Festival last year. In between they have managed to fit in other aspects of craft work, many of which they have tackled for the first time, including wild weaving. They also made the banner which led the procession at the opening of the village pageant, The Chronicle of Cynllaith, in the summer of 2005. As if this is not enough, Alison Beeston, the group co-ordinator, somehow makes time to record everything in a splendid Scrap Book, definitely worth a look and a work of art in itself.

A lot of hard work, dedication and creativity goes into all their activities – but so does a lot of laughter and companionship. We'd love to know how wild their weaving became in the end, though!

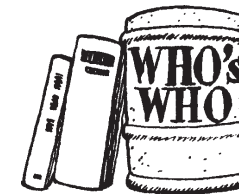

With the extra funding from the garden recycling containers, we have managed to raise between us almost £900 in the past year. £600 of this will pay the insurance costs of the playing fields, though this only covers the public liability insurance. We still need extra funds for this so will be holding a fund-raising event in the future. Llansilin Local History Society: Report on the 2007 Season of Meetings

The Society continues to enjoy wonderful support from members and guests, for which the officers and committee are most grateful. There have been 8 talks and 2 visits in the programme. Every talk has been interesting and authoritative. Average attendance has been in the thirties, which is most creditable for such a "local" society.

The talk given last year by Paul Hughes about the Hughes family of Llansilin was updated and repeated in the Memorial Hall to a big gathering of his family and friends but open to all. This was outside our programme but essentially under our auspices. We had planned 3 visits this year, but unfortunately the visit to Offa's Dyke and Summer Picnic was decisively rained-off! The other trips to Port Sunlight and to Llanyblodwell church were very well attended and most interesting.

We had a short-notice request from Shropshire Museums and Archives Service to put on a display in Oswestry Library for Oswestry History Week. Thanks to some available material belonging to Charles Stiles we were able to show some of the research which he had done towards his book. Due to delay in getting the site ready in the Church/Parish Room, the steel storage cupboards for our archives have not been finally placed. We are reluctant to start using them because they will be so difficult to move once filled with documents. The Glyndwr Sign sub-group has made a little progress during the year. Once again we are grateful to our Programme Secretary, Mrs Hanson, for coordinating the speakers and visits, and to the other officers for their respective roles.

RHYDYCROESAU AREA DESIGN PLAN

Over the past year or so, a group of residents from the area around Rhydycroesau (including Llanforda and Sychtyn) has been working together to find out the views of local people about the way in which they would wish to see the area develop in the future. The group has received a National Lottery Grant of £5300 from Awards for All to support the project and and pay for the publishing of the final report.

The written draft document should be available to members of the public at the Rhydycroesau Christmas Fayre on Saturday, 8 December and a public feedback meeting will be held early in the New Year. The final document will then be submitted to Oswestry Borough and Rural Councils for adoption and copies will be sent to Powys County Council and Llansilin Community Council.

LLANSILIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the September meeting the clerk, H Hughes, reported that the planning application to develop land opposite the Wynnstay had been refused, due mainly to access problems. A revised application would be considered in due course. Only one unlicensed car had been removed from Bryn Celyn and the other moved onto the grass. The following planning applications were supported: erection of building at Pentre Barn, Llansilin; erection of agricultural building at Maensilio, Rhiwlas; extension and alterations at Darwin Cottage, Llansilin. A retrospective application for alterations to roof and porch at Penyfedwen, Bwlchgwyn was not supported as this work had been carried out contrary to conditions contained in granting consent to a previous application.

Members agreed to renew the contract with C & G Management for water control equipment in the public conveniences. Notification was received from Powys Highways about a road diversion at Rhosddu, Cefn Canol. Following a suggestion from the clerk, Tai Clwyd had agreed to hold an open day for community councillors to inspect the new properties in Llansilin before they were occupied.

Goodbye to the village shop

The Glyndwr Garage shop and petrol station closed in November. Neither has been viable for some considerable time but Mike and Judith Evans have kept them going as a service to the village. The shop in particular will be greatly missed, not just as a place to buy our daily newspaper and groceries, but as a focus for the whole village. We could catch up on local news, find out what was on and it will be a particular blow to all those who can't easily get into town. Phyllis Hughes is seen here coming out of the shop. "It's very sad", she said. "I come in two or three times a week for my groceries and a little chat." We all join Phyllis in thanking Mike and Judith for running the shop all these years and send them our best wishes for the future.



Did you know? ... that within living memory the village was served by a variety of shops and services. A Midland Bank Branch used to open two days a week. There was a cobbler and shoe maker, a tailor, 3 grocers, a clothes shop, café and hairdresser and a butcher. One shop ran a Savings Club, the Post Office was open every day and 3 doctors held surgeries at several houses along the main street.

NEWS FROM YSGOL BRO CYNLLAITH

The whole school had an enjoyable "Story Walk" around the village and down School Lane in September, organised by Rick Wilson and Helen East. The children really enjoyed getting out in the fresh air on a warm autumn day.

Thanks to everyone who helped us collect Sainsbury Vouchers for school equipment. This year we have concentrated on cookery items and have received a vast array of equipment including bowls, spoons, graters, a liquidiser, oven gloves, aprons, baking trays, rolling pins and much much more.

Year 6 children attended a "Crucial Crew" event in Park Hall organised by Oswestry Rotary Club. The children are shown a number of different safety scenarios and have to work out points of danger in each. They were also invited to take part in a tag rugby event organised by COBRA rugby team and were delighted to have won all 3 of their games having never played the game before.

We were delighted that the Over-60's Club were able to join us for our harvest service on 16 October. The older children took the service and we are pleased to announce that £143.86 was raised and will be forwarded to "Farm Africa".

Parents, governors and friends of the school have been giving the outside a bit of a face lift. We have had two busy Saturdays painting, gardening and generally tidying up and it looks absolutely fantastic - what a difference a lick of paint makes!! Many thanks to everyone who contributed and a big thank you to Focus in Oswestry for their donation of paint, brushes etc.

We regret to have to end on a negative note. We had to call the police into school when the safety lid on our gas tank was wrenched from the ground leaving all the internal workings on display. The police have talked to the children about the dangers of such things, and vandalism in general, and have promised to keep an eye on things, especially during out of school hours.

LLANSILIN MEMORIAL HALL 1924 to 2007

The following is an extract from the minutes of a meeting which took place in October 1923. The meeting was that of a General Committee (including a Young Men's Committee) that was formed circa 1919 for the purpose of providing a memorial to those who gave their lives in the First World War.

“The Committee have been engaged since 1919 in promoting a fund for the purpose of providing a suitable memorial to the gallant Soldiers from the Parish of Llansilin who gave their lives in the Great War; and to place upon record the names of all others who responded to the call of their country in the dark days of its need.

In proportion to the number of its inhabitants, Llansilin occupies a proud position in respect of the number who served in the War. Of the number of its young men who joined the forces, 30 unfortunately did not return. It is to the memory of these that we desire to erect a Memorial worthy of their great sacrifice. It is proposed that the Memorial shall take the form of a Village Institute, and attached thereto a Concert Hall, both of which are urgently needed in the parish.

Capt. Ridge A.R.I.B.A. of Oswestry, has been engaged as Architect; the plans have been approved by the Committee, the Contract has been placed and building operations are well advanced. The plans provide an Institute with a large room for recreation purposes; also accommodation for a Caretaker to live on the premises. Adjoining the Institute is a large Hall to accommodate about 600 people.

The site has been given by the President, who will also give a free conveyance of the land. By this Conveyance, it is proposed to create a Trust to secure the future maintenance and administration of the Memorial Hall for all time.”

The President of the committee who gave the land upon which the Hall was built was one Alderman Edward Hughes, J.P., M.B.E., Glyndwr, Wrexham and Ffrydlyn, Llansilin. The hall was completed soon after the above meeting at an estimated cost of £1500 and officially opened on 15 April 1924 by Dame Margaret Lloyd George.

Between 1924 and 1985 the hall was managed under the original conveyance and trust deed by a committee of trustees. However, in 1985 the Charity Commission was approached to produce a revised governing document (Constitution) which provided for trustees to be appointed from across all the community organisations.

Due to the rural isolation of Llansilin and its surrounding communities of Moelfre, Llangadwaladr, Rhiwlas, Cefn Canol and Cymdu, with no regular public transport,

the hall has played and continues to play a significant part in the life of the community, providing premises and equipment for the following community group activities, many of which would be unable to function without the availability of the hall premises:

Llansilin Primary School (Ysgol Bro Cynllaith), Youth Club, Cymdeithas Ddywylliadol (Literary Society), Llansilin Playschool (Cylch Meithrin), Over 60s Club, Women's Institute, Indoor Bowls Club, Community Council, History Society, Karate Club, Annual Village Show, Whist Drives, Parochial Church Council activities, Playing Fields Association, Côr Cymysg Llansilin (Llansilin Mixed Choir), Dyffryn Tanat Young Farmers Club, Drama Group, Table Tennis Club, Childrens' parties, Funeral teas, Coffee mornings/evenings, Concerts, Dramas, Elections etc.

The Hall Management Committee is currently made up of community elected members (10), community organisation representatives (20) and co-optative (1) members as required by the Constitution. The representative members are appointed by their respective community organisation to serve on the Hall Management Committee as trustees. The elected members are appointed at the public Annual General Meeting which usually takes place in early June.

The usage of the premises by the community is high and this is reflected in the number of times the premises have been used on an annual basis (i.e. an activity/event taking place in the main hall or institute separately or together 1 April to 31 March) over the past few years. The annual usage figures may be of some interest: 1998/9 = 326; 1999/2000 = 469; 2000/1 = no figures available; 2002/3 = 405; 2003/4 = 388; 2004/5 = 391; 2005/6 = 406; 2006/7 = 452. These figures exclude daily school use but include after school clubs.

The hall committee has a rolling programme of improvements to the premises to try and cater for as many activities as possible and appropriate as well as keep up with ongoing statutory regulations. Amongst many other projects, was the major storage and entrance extension in 1999. The current projects in hand are for the installation of a fire alarm system and fire doors to conform with new fire safety regulations which have recently been applied for small and medium places of assembly (i.e. village halls).

These projects demonstrate the committee's commitment to serve the community of Llansilin and surrounding areas with a village hall fit for purpose and honouring the original purpose for which Llansilin Memorial Hall was brought into being.
