Dear Friends,

The Lambeth Conference occurs once every ten years in the Anglican Communion. This year it had the particularly difficult task of dealing with differences in belief among Anglican Bishops. I rejoice that the Church faces up to tricky issues by debating them.

This year there was quite a fuss ahead of the Conference, which led to a small group of Bishops, primarily from America and Africa, boycotting the Lambeth Conference and convening a separate meeting at Jerusalem. It was inevitable that this, and the more controversial subjects discussed at Lambeth, grabbed the attention of the media. What the media failed to report though, was that those who attended Lambeth did so in true Christian spirit, that is, in non-adversarial manner and without rancour. Participants listened courteously to one another and discussed divisive issues threatening the Anglican Communion.

‘What has this to do with Llansilin?’ I hear you ask. Divisions within the Church seem to mirror those petty squabbles and differences of opinion that easily create squabbles and faction in everyday life. We should acknowledge how well our village community gets on together. We may fall out occasionally as we air our opinions, but the meeting at Lambeth shows us that we can hold diverse opinions, and debate and discuss them courteously, provided we never lose sight of our common goal of living amicably one with another. Whenever there is division, Christ bids us all show kindness and consideration to one another, whatever the issue.

Church and Chapel do not quarrel. We meet together for formal occasions and, whatever our denomination, we work together in shared Christian interest. This example of co-operation and Christian precept is nowhere more apparent than in the numerous examples of selfless loving compassion shown by individual villagers towards one another. These ‘angels’ are well known, but I draw readers’ attention to their activities as examples of truly Christian ways of living.

We are fortunate to live in Llansilin - a diverse, yet compassionate and caring community - and we should thank God daily for this.

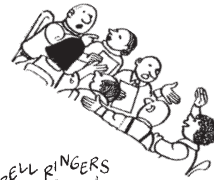
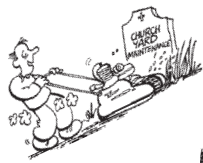

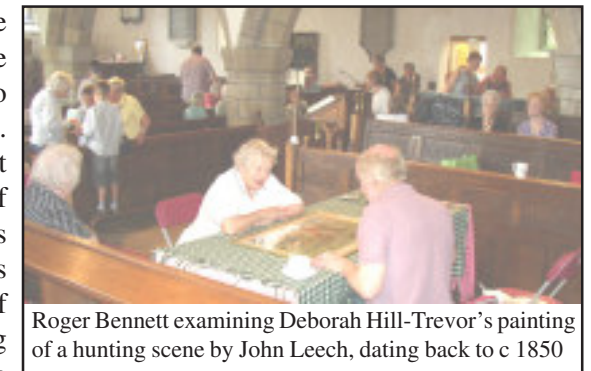

Awaiting them were members of the Shropshire Collectors' Club, ready to identify and value the objects. We were very fortunate to have experts specialising in a wide range of antiques and most of them had brought along examples from their own collections. The church was vibrant, not just with the sunshine pouring in, but also with beautiful old objects as far as the eye could see. It was a perfect setting and the whole place buzzed with excitement.

The experts clearly relished the opportunity to find out the history of the objects and to discuss their significance. Many people were astonished at the importance and worth of things they had more or less taken for granted over the years – there will be a fair bit of trepidation during the dusting from now on! The pews were filled with people patiently waiting their turn, while others wandered around admiring the objects and hearing their stories from the proud owners.

With their containers of water at the ready, everyone rose to the challenge and no one could have guessed there was anything amiss.

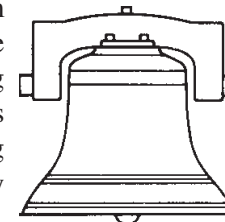

LLANSILIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the Annual General Meeting, Cllr Emyr Evans was appointed chairman and welcomed Cllr Hugh Edwards to his first meeting and also newly elected C.Cllr Aled Davies. Cllr J M Jones was elected vice chairman. The retiring chairman, Cllr Hywel Jones thanked members and the clerk for their support during his term of office. It was agreed that the clerk write to the three retired members thanking them for their services to the community. The casual vacancy was filled by unanimously co-opting Mr P Lovell. Cllrs Evans, Jones and Sockett were appointed to the planning sub-committee and Cllrs Evans and Aled Davies were appointed to represent the council on the youth club committee.

The following planning applications were supported: erection of extensions and alterations at Ddol Hir; erection of 2 dwellings on land adjacent to Tynllan; change of use from stables to residential accommodation at former Malt House stables and also listed building consent; erection of dwelling (outline) and construction of vehicular access on land adjacent to Berwynfa; erection of dwelling, vehicular access and installation of septic tank on field no. 8256 Bwlchydonge.

Members were not in favour of any reduction in the current lighting system in Llansilin village, though they were of the opinion that in some instances street lighting in the small hamlets could be reduced. The clerk was asked to deal with complaints about water on road near Bryncelyn and pothole near Fron Rhiwlas.

The July meeting was chaired by Cllr E O Evans and Cllr Pat Lovell, the recently co-opted member, was welcomed to his first meeting. Two planning applications were supported: erection of temporary wind monitoring mast at Llechrydau, Selattyn and conversion of outbuildings to 3 dwellings at Tynllan, Llansilin.

It was agreed to renew membership of Clwyd Community Chest. Members felt that the BT payphone in Rhydycroesau should be retained for emergency purposes despite its limited use as there is no mobile signal in this area. It was agreed that if vandalism in the Llansilin public convenience persists they would be compelled

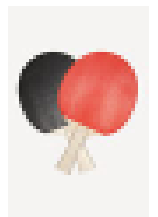
Together these activities raised £535.40. The local committee thanks all who have supported Christian Aid through their work and donations.

However, we think we have solved that one and are monitoring both areas on a regular basis.

'Medecins Sans Frontieres' Film Show

"Invisibles" – a series of five films, directed by five of Spain's leading film directors – was shown to a select audience, in Llansilin Church on the evening of 18 July. I suspect that no-one was quite sure what to expect – and what they did see, took their breath away. There was total silence and everyone seemed frozen in their seats. The films covered the plight of people, in various remote parts of the world, suffering from disease and violence, both sexual, military and political, as well as ongoing severe poverty and lack of food.

There was a welcome break for tea and biscuits, when a collection was taken. The sum raised was the magnificent amount of £115. Although these films sound as if they were terrible to watch, the skill and direction of the complete artists in their field, made them eminently watchable. On behalf of MSFI would like to thank all those who did come, the valiant tea makers and, of course, Chris Burton, without whose technical skill and effort, the show would not have been possible.
